School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

Pioneer Drive School was built in 1949 and modernized in 1991. It sits on 8.25 acres of which 5.68 acres is playground. This school has 32 classrooms, a multi-purpose facility, bookroom, teacher intervention room, behavior intervention/psychologist room, speech room, teacher professional development/coaching room, pre-k classroom, and a library. The campus also has a staff dining, lounge and a workroom.

The custodial staff adheres to a weekly cleaning schedule that includes classrooms, restrooms, cafeteria and kitchen areas.

The District's Mobile Maintenance Team visits the school site at least twice a year. Maintenance emergencies are addressed immediately. District personnel maintain the grounds at least once every two weeks.

This site also is maintained to ensure a clean, safe, and functional facility as determined pursuant to a Facility Inspection Tool developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction.

2023-24 School Safety Plan

Pioneer Drive established its Comprehensive School Safety Plan in 1998. A law enforcement officer specializing in safety provided direction in the establishment of the School Safety Plan. Pioneer Drive's School Safety Plan is current and is updated annually, every February. Key elements of Pioneer Drive's School Safety Plan include the following: (a) routine and emergency disaster procedures; (b) suspension, and expulsion procedures; (c) teacher notification of pupils with a specific discipline history; (d) child abuse reporting procedures, (e) the district's sexual harassment policy; (f) school crime data; (g) the student dress code; (h) safe entrance and exit procedures; (i) the civil defense and disaster plan; and (j) discipline rules and procedures. Our overall goal is to maintain a safe and orderly school environment conducive to learning. Starting the 2022-2023 school year, our Comprehensive School Safety Plan follows the Standard Response Protocol (SRP) guidelines for how to respond to safety incidents like Shelter, Evacuate, Lockout and Lockdown, and the campus will participate in monthly drills covering these 4 areas. The School Safety Plan was reviewed with the staff on February 1, 2023. School Site Council was held on February 15, 2023 for review and approval of the school safety plan.

Professional Development

Professional development is designed to provide continuous learning opportunities for administrators, teachers, and classified personnel. Training opportunities affirm the basic philosophy of education that learning is a lifelong process that contributes to the well-being of the students, teachers, administrators, and community. Professional Development is an essential component of effective instruction and student learning.

All training revolves around identified needs of students and adults for the purpose of the improvement of instruction and increasing content knowledge. Central to all training are student achievement data, district focus areas, the Common Core State Standards, the state adopted standards-based instructional materials, and strategies to effectively teach the academic content standards to all students.

During the 2022-2023 school year, district professional development focused on supporting good first instruction and the use of core instructional materials in all content areas. In preparation of the school year, teachers were offered three full days of professional development sponsored by the district and additional dates at the school sites. Regularly scheduled follow ups and extensions to summer learning were provided throughout the school year. Topics addressed the use of core curriculum to support the Next Generation Science Standards, Foundational Reading Skills, Reading Comprehension, Using Manipulatives, Literature and Problem Solving in Mathematics, Project Based Learning and incorporating technology.

Additional support was provided by academic coaches and district specialists for reading/language arts, mathematics, science, writing and social emotional learning. The district provided time and resources for collaboration, planning, and professional development. Additionally, professional development on Multi-Tiered Systems of Support and Support to school and district teams.

Teachers new to the District received four days of professional development prior to the beginning of the school year focused on orientation to District and school site policies and services, Common Core State Standards, classroom management, curriculum and pacing, using technology and setting up the classroom. Teachers in their second year with the District received two days of professional development prior to the beginning of the school year provided by the school site and focused on improving best practices.

New teachers with California preliminary credentials received professional development through the Bakersfield City School District (BCSD) Teacher Induction Program (TIP). The focus of BCSD TIP is being mentored by an experienced teacher, growing in the California Standards for the Teaching Profession (CSTP) and meeting the California Induction standards. The culmination of TIP is the recommendation for the CA Clear Credential. Each TIP teacher was assigned a veteran teacher who served as a mentor. The mentors received on-going professional development in coaching/mentoring strategies, instructional strategies, and guiding cycles of inquiry. Professional development was provided through individual mentoring, monthly meetings, and after-school workshops.

Intern teachers received professional development at monthly meetings focusing on the initial teaching skills of the CSTP including classroom management, lesson planning, assessment, and establishing a climate that is conducive to student achievement. Each Intern was assigned a mentor that provided day-to-day support in these areas as well as advisement toward meeting credential requirements. Mentors received monthly professional development in meeting the needs of Intern teachers. Interns also received coursework and supervision from universities partnered with BCSD to provide the Intern Program.

Teachers on Short Term Staffing Permits (STSPs) were provided mentors and monthly trainings on beginning pedagogy and best teaching practices. Each teacher on a STSP designed a plan to meet requirements to move to a CA Intern or Preliminary Credential. Support was provided for required testing and BCSD staff worked closely with university partners to ensure teachers on permits were taking prerequisite requirements to move to credentials.

Teachers on Provisional Intern Permits (PIPs) were provided a weekly cohort meeting focused on beginning pedagogy. Two cohort meetings occurred weekly to allow teachers on a PIP to work around university course schedules. Support was provided for required testing and BCSD staff worked closely with university partners to ensure teachers on permits were taking prerequisite requirements to move to credentials.
